

EPA Releases Top 25 List of Cities with Most Energy Star Buildings

Atlanta makes top five, cutting energy costs while increasing efficiency, protecting health, reducing pollution

WASHINGTON – Today, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the sixth annual list of the [top 25 U.S. metropolitan areas](#) with the most [Energy Star](#) certified buildings. The cities on this list demonstrate the economic and environmental benefits achieved by facility owners and managers when they apply a proven approach to energy efficiency to their buildings.

The Top 10 cities on the list are: Los Angeles; Washington, D.C.; Atlanta; New York; San Francisco; Chicago; Dallas; Denver; Philadelphia; and Houston.

"Not only are the Energy Star top 25 cities saving money on energy costs and increasing energy efficiency, but they are promoting public health by decreasing greenhouse gas emissions from commercial buildings," said Administrator Gina McCarthy. "Every city has an important role to play in reducing emissions and carbon pollution, and increasing energy efficiency to combat the impacts of our changing climate."

Energy use in commercial buildings accounts for 17 percent of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions at a cost of more than \$100 billion per year. Energy Star certified office buildings cost \$0.50 less per square foot to operate than average office buildings, and use nearly two times less energy per square foot than average office buildings.

The data also show that more than 23,000 buildings across America earned EPA's Energy Star certification by the end of 2013. These buildings saved more than \$3.1 billion on utility bills and prevented greenhouse gas emissions equal to the annual electricity use from 2.2 million homes.

First released in 2008, the list of cities with the most Energy Star certified buildings continues to demonstrate how cities across America, with help from Energy Star, are embracing energy efficiency as a simple and effective way to save money and prevent pollution. Los Angeles has remained the top city since 2008 while Washington, D.C. continues to hold onto second place for the fifth consecutive year. Atlanta moved up from the number five to number three. For the first time, Philadelphia entered the top 10, ranking ninth.

Commercial buildings that earn EPA's Energy Star must perform in the top 25 percent of similar buildings nationwide and must be independently verified by a licensed professional engineer or a registered architect. Energy Star certified buildings use an average of 35 percent less energy and are responsible for 35 percent less carbon dioxide emissions than typical buildings. Many types of commercial buildings can earn the Energy Star, including office buildings, K-12 schools, hotels, and retail stores.

Products, homes and buildings that earn the Energy Star label prevent greenhouse gas emissions by meeting strict energy efficiency requirements set by the U.S. EPA. In 2013 alone, Americans, with the help of Energy Star, saved an estimated \$30 billion on their utility bills and prevented greenhouse gas emissions equal to the annual electricity use of more than 38 million homes. From the first Energy Star qualified computer in 1992, the Energy Star label can now be found on products in more than 70 different categories, with more than 4.5 billion sold. Over 1.5 million new homes and 23,000 commercial buildings and industrial plants have earned the Energy Star label.



Efficiency Still Matters

Amid a sea of other controversial issues, our United States' Congress has remained riddled with one central dilemma: how to effectively reign in spending? We all know it needs to be done but beyond the rhetoric, reigning in spending is a very complex and multifaceted consideration with serious economic implications. Bipartisan pieces of energy legislation such as the

Senate's Shaheen-Portman have been stalled in Congress, in part due to doubts concerning mandating certain aspects of energy efficiency and renewable energy.

At the state level, recently both Indiana ([SB-340](#)) and Ohio ([SB-310](#)) have taken significant steps toward rolling back major efficiency mandates that drive our industry in a positive direction. A common thread in both of these initiatives was what can only be described as “the cost of efficiency.” ASHRAE Atlanta remains the local resource of subject matter experts for the built environment. As we observe these trends occurring in neighboring regions we must be mindful to remain vigilant in promoting the tangible benefits of efficiency that far outweigh the costs. Below is the current profile of applicable standards and codes for the state of Georgia. Let us continue to work toward building a healthier, more efficient and sustainable Georgia.

I am writing to thank ASHRAE for its financial support of my trip to the winter meeting in New York City. Without your support, I simply would not have been able to make the trip and I believe I would have missed out on a great experience.

From the time that I began my engineering coursework in 2010, I have been curious as to how engineers are involved in our built environment and what it means to engineer buildings for sustainability. The winter meeting was a great opportunity for me to be surrounded by engineers that are doing exactly those things. During the meeting, I was able to attend a number of sessions focused on sustainability. They ranged in scope from detailed topics about using cooling tower water for irrigation, to presentations about the impacts of the building envelope on sustainability, to large scale topics such as GIS and community planning for net zero energy use. All of these topics were well presented and allowed me to really see what sustainable engineering is all about and to better understand many of the challenges that lie ahead for our built environment.

Each session that I attended was of great value to me, but they were really not the only value in the conference. While at the conference, I was also able to attend the 189.1 technical committee meeting, which provided some insight as to how I might be able to be more involved in ASHRAE in the future. Finally, the conference provided some great opportunities for networking and meeting other professionals. This networking is always a great help in identifying opportunities in the field such as projects to work on, possible employment, and future engineering mentors.

History Corner

This story seems like it happened a very long time ago but in reality it was a very short time ago. Remember the great 2014 Atlanta snowpocalypse?

On January 28th 2014, I left my office in midtown around 1 pm. The streets were already getting crowded with traffic, and it took me 15 or so minutes to leave the parking deck and make a left turn into 15th street. I-75 N was moving OK until I saw a highway sign indicating that it would take 75 to 85 minutes to get to the Delk Road exit about 6 or 7 miles away. I exited I-75 at the Northside Pkwy and drove towards the entrance to I-285. At that time the traffic started crawling along the road. I entered I-285 going west and got out at the US-41 exit (Cobb Pkwy). The traffic was just barely moving there. It took about an hour to get to the intersection with Herodian. I stopped at the gas station there and filled up the tank. I tried to continue north on 41 but after about 30 minutes of not moving I turned around and went across I-75 on Windy Ridge and took Interstate N Parkway trying to get to Windy Hill.



Big mistake.

The closer I got to Windy Hill the slower the traffic became. At one point, around 5 pm, I could see a sign for “Extended Stay” about a block away so I decided I would stop there and see if I could get a room (tried online with no luck). It took another hour or so to reach the entrance to the Extended Stay. They were booked, so I went into Pappasito’s Restaurant, which has a back entrance at that spot. I parked my car in their parking lot and went across Windy Hill to survey the area. Windy Hill was completely clogged with traffic attempting to go east (uphill) towards the I-75 entrance. The west lanes were clear but for a few cars that had already been abandoned. The problem there was that a sheet of ice covered the entire road.

I saw a motel there, The Country Hearth Inn, and decided to call the telephone number they advertized in their sign to see if I could get a room. They told me that there were some reservations that had not shown yet so I should call back later. I went into Pappasitos and had dinner. Then I walked back to the motel to see if I could get the room. I stood in line behind other people that were being turned away because they had no rooms available. When I got to the front to talk to the clerk I told her I had called earlier and she said that there was no change on the reservations yet, and then at that precise moment, this guy that was standing in the lobby

After I got the room, I decided to walk across Windy Hill for the 4th time to retrieve my computer bag from the car. That almost turned out to be the biggest mistake I ever made. The road must've gotten slicker because as I went pass the cars in the eastbound lanes I looked up and someone crossing the road a few yards above me had fallen and was getting up, I attempted to continue but the next thing I know is, my feet left from under me and I hit the ground hard on my back and on the back of my head. I don't how I got up from there without any injuries; I guess my guardian angel was hard at work. Also there were a few other people guarding the Papassito's entrance to prevent traffic from going into their parking lot, they help me get up, find my glasses which had flown far away from me, and finish crossing the street.

I retrieved my bag and went back and crossed Wind Hill again with much caution. The motel room was great at any price under those circumstances. I would give it at least a ¼ Star.


